

Teen Dating Violence & Economic Abuse



A survey of 13–19 year olds across the U.S. highlighted an often overlooked element of teen dating violence – economic abuse.



2,854 the number of teens who completed the survey in 2021

70% percent of teens that dated in the previous year who experienced dating violence

Economic abuse occurs when a partner tries to interfere with and control how money is used in the relationship. This can impact how someone pursues education, their ability to pursue or maintain employment and limiting their choices on how they use their money.



less than half think that economic abuse is dating violence yet many have experienced economic abuse in their relationships

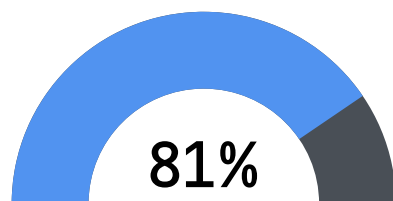

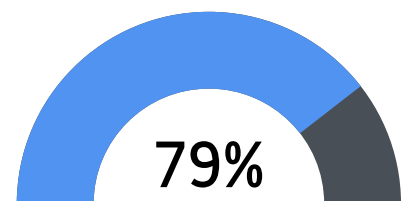
of teens surveyed experienced some form of financial control or exploitation
